

On August 11, 2010,
Melvin L. Noland, of Kingsville
passed away. Mel had served
as a forest landowner on
MFA's Board of Governors
since 2000 and served for
many years on its legislative
and educational outreach
committees. Mel had been
awarded MFA's "Educator of
the Year" award in 1999 for his
environmental education



efforts in Baltimore County and throughout the State.

As chair of the Baltimore County Forestry Council, he built coalitions of businesses, community, and government leaders to advance the mission of the Council. He facilitated hundreds of tree plantings, pioneens dechool-based tree grow-out stations, and conducted countless workshops. The Chesapeaks Bay Trust was honored to have presented Mel with our Ellen Fraites Wagner award in 2003 to recognize his amazing achievements as a volunteer and steward of the Bay. He was the current president of the Maryland Association of Forest Conservancy District Boards which won the Governor's Volunteer Service Award in 2008 under Mel's leadership and tenuns. In 2009 Mel was awarded the highest honor given to a Maryland citizen by the governor, the "Admiral of the Chesapeaks Bay" award, for his years of dedication to forestry, forest resources and forest issues in Maryland.

Natural Resources Careers Conference (NRCC) 2010

2010 was another exciting and fun-filled year for NRCC! The summer educational conference for high echool students interested in forestry and natural resources took place July 25-31 at the Hickory Environmental Education Center in Garnett County, Maryland. Twenty-six students from 12 Maryland counties attended this year; half were from the western region.

Steve Resh. MFA member. Forestry Professor at Allegany College

of Maryland, and Curriculum Director at NRCC, selected six of his ACM students to lead small groups of high school students. creating a phenomenal student-to-teacher ratio which facilitated covering lots of material in one weeks time.

This year the NRCC staff welcomed Brad Metzger of the Allegany County Forestry Board and Soils Specialist for the

Maryland Department of the Environment to teach one of the Monday field rotations at the Casselman River. His participation and expertise were much appreciated.

Monday is also Career Night at NRCC. Steve Resh follows a **What's My Live?** format for students to quiz the panelists about their professions. The students congregate with their team members and come up with questions requiring 'yes' or 'no' answers to uncover cluss about a panelist's job. This year both your MFA Executive Director Karin

Miller and MFA Board Member Pete Miller were among the fine professional participants. To date, no group has ever correctly quessed Karin's profession!

The tuition fees collected for student participants do not cover all of NRCCs operating expenses. In addition to its participation in program exents, MFA has also been an important financial supporter of NRCCs ince 2005 and this year donated \$500 for operating expenses. The additional money from financial contributors like MFA is essential to program success and sustainability.

The western Maryland weather was a wonderful relief from the brutally hot and humid conditions left behind in the eastern parts of the state. Brief rains howers did not hamper any of the planned outdoor educational activities. However the severe thunderstorm back in Montgomery County did prevent PEPCO from participating in the Thursday urban forsetry panel and conducting the hotline demonstration. The gap was graciously filled by the talented and flexible Bartlett Tree Experts Peter, Rob, and Joe, and Davey Tree Expert Steve who worked side by side on an amazing demonstration of felling a 75-foot dying hickory tree.

Forest Service personnel including Becky Wilson, Clarise a Harrie, Kandy Kamp, and recently retired Bernie Zlomek continued to faithfully serve as NKCC instructors, maintaining the high quality education offered at this conference.

The major themes emphasized to the students by many speakers this year were to volunteer, stay active, seek out summer internships, be open to many opportunities in natural resources, and be willing to travel. The speakers were wonderful role models, showing great enthusiasm and passion for their work.

Mark your calendars now for NRCC 2011: July 24-30. NRCC tuition will be \$400. an increase of \$50. The s tudent activity fee will remain the same at \$100. Updated NRCC 2011 materials for distribution will be forthcoming in October. Applications will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis until full attendance (48 students) is reached, or until NRCC Director Gabrielle Oldham closes enrollment to finalize preparations for the conference.

Six schools participated in our Wednesday college night: University of Maryland-College Park, Virginia Tech-Blacksburg, West Virginia University-Morgantown, Frostburg State University, Garrett College, and Allegany College of Maryland. These college professors and recruiters to uted the benefits of their programs in forestry and natural resources. Penn State has apparently dropped their participation in NRCC. Ten of the 26 high school students this year

opted to take the mastery exam for college credit. All but one passed.

Garrett County Forsetry Board members and Hickory
Environmental Education Center staff planned and held a memorial
tree planting at Hickory during NRCC week this year (photo below).
The NRCC students attended the brief ceremony, showing great
compassion and empathy by voluntarily staying to help the NRCC
staff, ACM students, GCFB members, family and friends plant a

sugar maple in memory of Karin and Pete Miller's son Mike, who passed away A pril 28th from complications of heat shock. Mike was a former ACM forset technology student and the only NRCC team leader to serve two years. Steve Resh delivered a warm and heartfelt eulogy.

USDA Announces Conservation Loan Program

The LGDA has announced the Conservation Loan (CL) program, which provides farm owners and farm-related business operators access to credit to implement conservation techniques that will conserve natural resources. CL funds can be used to implement conservation practices approved by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), such as the installation of conservation structures; establishment of forest cover; installation of water conservation measures; establishment or improvement of permanent pastures; implementation of manure management; and the adaptation of other emerging or existing conservation practices, techniques, or technologies.

Direct CLs can be obtained through local Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices with loan limits up to \$300,000. Guaranteed CLs up to \$1,112,000 are available from lenders working with FSA. DUTIES OF MFA BOARD MEMBERS

The Board of Governors will have supervision, control, and direction of the affairs of the Association, its committees, and publications; will determine its policies; will actively promote its objectives; and supervise the disbursement of its funds. Board members are elected by the members of the Association and must be current members of the Association.

- Board members serve for a three-year term
- One-third of the Board is elected each year for a 3-year term. Board members will be elected by the general membership.
- Each region will be represented by at least one person from that region in each of the 3-year overlapping terms.
- Work to insure sound fiscal management of the Associations assets.
- Represent themselves as advocates for forestry on the Board and in Association business.
- Represent their region as a point of contact and to assist in membership activities, including fundraising, as well as attending and actively participate in MFA activities/events in their region.
- Attend and actively participate in MFA Board of Governor's quarterly meetings.
- Board members are expected to attend at least 3 of the 4 meetings per year.
- Any board member who misses two meetings in row is subject to removal from office by a 2/3 vote of the Board members present.
- Actively serve on at least one MFA committee.
- Attend and actively participate in the MFA Annual Conference.
- All Board members are expected to notify the President or Executive Director if they will be absent from a Board meeting.
